## The LSAT: How can you effectively prepare for it?

- Create an account with LSAC, which allows you to register for the LSAT (\$190) and to apply to law schools using their Credential Assembly Service (\$195 lasts for five years): https://www.lsac.org/applying-law-school/jd-application-process/infographic
  - **Fee Waivers** are available for both services but must be submitted **at least six before** the <u>REGISTRATION Deadline</u> of the LSAT you plan to take.

# Take a timed Official LSAT Practice Test, which is crucial to establish your baseline score. RECOMMEND taking the LSAT Practice Test 6-8 months before you plan to take your real LSAT.

- Your baseline LSAT score will provide critical information regarding the amount of time needed for your LSAT prep. For example, if you plan to increase your score by 20+ points, you should expect to spend between 4-6 months preparing for the LSAT. However, if you want a score increase of eight points, you would need about to 10-12 weeks of LSAT prep.

### Best LSAT self-study guides - First preview material from these study guides, and pick the one that works for you.

- Manhattan Prep LSAT (3 books 1LR, 1LG, 1RC) w/ access to some additional online material (about \$40 each on Amazon). To save money, consider purchasing used earlier editions (like 2<sup>nd</sup> or 3<sup>rd</sup>) online. Although they are as helpful as the most recent 5<sup>th</sup> edition, you will lose access to the online material.
- The LSAT Trainer (1 book LR, LG, RC) w/ free access to multiple study schedules and other great LSAT prep resources (\$50 on Amazon). Best to purchase along with a couple of volumes of 10, Actual Official LSAT Preptests (vol. V and VI most recent) by LSAC (about \$25 on Amazon). Go to the website [http://www.thelsattrainer.com] to access free chapters and see resources.
- Blueprint LSAT books (1 LG & 1 RC) w/ video explanations for each logic game in the book (LG book- about \$40 on Amazon/RC book- about \$50 on Amazon). The best logic games guide available.
- WARNING—whatever study guide you choose, make sure it uses official (LSAC released) LSAT practice questions and tests. Look for a © for LSAC on the copyright page or specific information for each question identifying the official Practice Test.
