Overview

Eligibility for admission to the joint BA/MIA program requires students to be declared as a Political Science major, have a major GPA of 3.4, a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0, and to have completed lower and upper division department-based course work. Applicants to the program are admitted in the spring quarter of the junior year. Upon admission, the student must change their major to Political Science - International Affairs (PS33). There is a required internship between the senior and graduate year.
