- Departments/programs release seats for new students.
- Enrollment Guidance from your College viewable on New Triton Advising for all first-year and transfer students at vac.ucsd.edu
- Use the academic planning guide from the PoliSci website! If you have questions, first-year students can access their college and major advisors through Online Advising (internally called E-VAC).
- ☐ The estimated date for all (or most) on-time transcript evaluation to be completed by Admissions around mid-August
- ☐ First-Years enroll starting the week of August 12th (First Pass in a 2-Pass System)

First day of classes is **September 23rd**.

WAITLISTS AND ENROLLMENTS

- ☐ To add a class that is **full**, use WebReg to waitlist the course (during 2nd pass)
- Waitlists are automated and used by ALL departments. They run nightly until midnight on Thursday of second week.
 - ☐ The waitlist sequence is <u>first-come</u>, <u>first-served</u>. Departments cannot override the waitlist sequence.
- ☐ You will receive an email to your UCSD account if you have been added to the course. If you have not met the prerequisite, WebReg will drop you from the waitlist.

The Political Science Department does not allow late adds Enrollment Information:

- ☐ You must adhere to all add and drop deadlines.
- □ Incoming students: Before the quarter begins, you may be enrolled in and wait-listed for a total of 19.5 units. After the quarter commences, you may be enrolled in and wait-listed for a total of 22 units.

WAITLISTS AND ENROLLMENTS (CONT.)

All students now have a 2 Pass Enrollment system

- First pass begins for first-years on August 15th-17th
 - You may select open courses that add up to 11.5 units
 - Not able to waitlist any classes
- Second pass begins for first-years on August 20th
 - Longer time period to add courses (until Week 2 of Fall quarter = Add Deadline)
 - Can enroll or waitlist in up to 19.5 units
- Students can add up to 22 units without extra permission beginning the first day of Fall classes

 - Exploratory Track: Students are matched with a mentor outside of their top three fields
 - Connect with the mentor via one required "career conversation"
- Successful applicants will have
 - 1) A minimum 3.0 major GPA; and
 - 2) Earned at least 90 units

RESEARCH OPPORTUNITIES

Research Apprenticeship Program

- Work directly with a departmental mentor for the winter and spring quarters. Each student will collaborate with a grad PhD student mentor and work on the mentor's own research project.
 - Winter and Spring Quarter: Commitment to 12 hours/week as a research assistant; earn major credit (POLI 198RA)
 - Spring Quarter: Additional participation in a weekly research seminar (POLI 199); write a seminar paper of approximately 20 pages under guidance of graduate student mentor

Eligibility:

- Majors in Political Science
- □ Recommended major GPA of 3.0 or higher

Independent Research (POLI 199)

- ☐ Independent research project with ladder-rank department faculty
- Elective credit can be earned for the completion of two POLI 199s with 4 units each

SENIOR HONORS PROGRAM

Two quarter senior thesis project designed for highest achieving students

- □ Completion of POLI 191A + POLI 191B and honors thesis may qualify you for honors
- □ POLI 191A and POLI 191B are allowable for major credit toward the upper-division elective category; must earn a C- or better
- □ Eligibility: Senior standing, minimum 3.6 major GPA in order to be eligible, completed all lower division courses for your major, and completed a minimum of five UD POLI courses


